Indigenous leaders from nine Amazon Countries to Convene in Lima to Release New Research, Present Case Studies of Community-led Conservation Initiatives, and Demand Action to stop Destruction of Endangered Rainforests

With Climate on Global Agenda, Indigenous COP assembles Researchers, Civil Society Organizations, and Government Representatives in Bid to Save 80% of the Amazon by 2025, Critical for Meeting Global Climate and Biodiversity Goals

Indigenous leaders from the nine countries of the Amazon basin (Brazil, Guyana, Venezuela, Bolivia, French Guiana, Colombia, Peru, Suriname and Ecuador) will gather in September for a week-long congress in Lima, Peru, to present new research and discuss strategies for protecting the Amazon biome, one of the world's most vulnerable and important ecosystems for meeting global climate and biodiversity goals, and vital for ensuring food security and reducing pandemic risk.

Discouraged by the UNFCCC process and glacial pace of climate and biodiversity negotiations, Indigenous leaders with COICA, the Coordinating Organization of the Indigenous Peoples of the Amazon Basin (COICA), will host presentations by scientists, conservation NGOs, and government representatives, revealing biodiversity hotspots at imminent risk and requiring urgent action to stop a process that would turn large swaths of the Amazon into a dry savannah.

Recent satellite <u>data</u> released by the Brazilian Space Agency suggests that in the first half of 2022, the Brazilian Amazon experienced the highest deforestation rates since 2016 with an area five times thes size of New York cleared since January.

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The evidence to be presented at the congress will reveal that this pattern of deforestation is affecting, not just Brazil, but all of the Amazonian countries.

At the end of the week-long event and following an intense dialogue with stakeholders, the leaders will present a plan of action to protect 80% of the Amazon by 2025, a goal that goes far beyond what governments in the region have committed to as part of a global effort to conserve 30 percent of the planet by 2030.

In September, at the <u>IUCN Congress</u> in Marseille, IUCN members voted overwhelmingly to support the expansion of the land rights of Indigenous peoples as part of a new motion aimed at protecting 80 percent of forests in the region by 2025.

Although non-binding, the vote by the IUCN Congress was symbolically significant and unprecedented. It was submitted by COICA, an organization that represents two million Indigenous Amazonians belonging to communities that manage more than XX hectares of tropical forests, rivers, and other important ecosystems.

The IUCN includes among its members the world's most influential conservation organizations. Their vote was seen as a game changer, suggesting Indigenous organizations, and COICA in particular, has reached a new level of influence, supported by a growing body of evidence.

Also available for interviews are some of the experts whose work has raised the visibility of Indigenous and local communities efforts, traditional knowledge, and belief systems as critical for conserving intact ecosystems the World Economic Forum says are worth \$44 trillion to the global economic sector.

WHAT:

A series of press briefings and events organized by COICA will bring together researchers and Indigenous leaders to report new findings, recount stories, and reveal new case studies that demonstrate local peoples' ability to protect forests and biodiversity, promote sustainable development, and increase global food security and resilience to climate change.
